Dear friends,

From North America to Europe, national-populist movements and parties are on the march. In the United States, a nationalist demagogue has captured one of the major parties – and the White House. In Europe, nationalist movements are set to make further gains in May's upcoming European elections, continuing to elbow aside once-dominant mass political parties and upend the liberal order. As a result of an apparent inability to channel the Zeitgeist, progressive parties on both sides of the Atlantic find themselves out of power, with many in disarray.

The challenges that progressive parties across Europe and North America now face include stale themes and ideas; older leaders and legacy coalitions of interests that are out of touch with younger generations; and a misguided focus on propping up the status quo instead of embracing a political paradigm shift. To many, they have ceased to be credible agents of political innovation and social progress on topics that hugely matter to voters, including far-reaching structural changes in the economy.

While the challenges facing progressives in today's interdependent world are immense, so are the possibilities for change. We see an imperative for progressives to act by advocating a paradigm shift to a more sustainable and inclusive economy. There are no easy answers for how this can be achieved. But the experiences of the past decade's financial crisis have shown that a systemic change will require giving people a greater voice in making political decisions and in creating an economic system that is built on empowerment and fairness, not exclusion.

We believe it is time for a revitalised conversation and next-generation thinking among progressive parties and activists on both sides of the Atlantic, and beyond. Therefore, the key objective of the Progressive Governance Symposium 2019 is to rejuvenate the progressive movement, its governing philosophy, and its agenda based on cross-border dialogue among center-left politicians, parties, and leading thinkers.

The conference is hosted by Das Progressive Zentrum (Germany), the Foundation for European Progressive Studies (Brussels), the Progressive Policy Institute (USA), the Heinrich Böll Foundation (Germany), Policy Network (UK), the RSA (UK), VOLTA (Italy), Terra Nova (France), Fundación Alternativas (Spain), Fundação Res Publica (Portugal), Arenagruppen (Sweden), the Ferdinand Lassalle Centre (Poland), the Centre for European Reform (UK) and Social Europe (EU).

The **#PGS19** objectives and principles

The Progressive Governance Symposiums are unique in that they combine party-political networking and leaders forums with policy input from leading public intellectuals. They bring together politicians and intellectuals from social-democratic, green and liberal parties and movements from across the world to address key challenges to forward-looking politics and governments in today's globalised world. This year's symposium convenes people who seek to build shared prosperity and improve lives at the local, national, and transnational level.

Objectives of the day:

- Creating a space for informal intellectual reflection on the pressing political challenges of our time.
- Building momentum behind the progressive movement in its quest to reclaim thought leadership and increase its impact on the public debate.
- Offering an opportunity for exchange across party lines before coming together to celebrate.

The order of play and conversations at #PGS19

The symposium will kick off with invitation-only plenary and breakout sessions to examine major policy challenges and progressive solutions. In the evening, the symposium will go public with our leaders panels that will spark lively discussions on the future of progressive politics and transatlantic relations. After the hard work is done, we will switch into networking and dancing mode with our Celebrating Spring Party.

Our activities aim to promote an interactive and lively discussion among participants that is guided by five principles:

- Best-practice solutions: Exchanging policy les-1. sons, ideas, experiences and concepts amongst an international network of progressives in order to learn from each other and effect change;
- 2. Inclusive economy: Harnessing the forces of globalisation and new tech to secure more inclusive prosperity and sustainability;

- Combining the power of state, market, and citi-3. zens: Rethink the relationship between the state, market and citizens, defining new roles for state policies, market forces and grassroots-level activism to achieve ambitious goals.
- 4. Fairness and justice: Identifying ways to promote economic growth, good jobs, and shared prosperity while mitigating the social risks of structural change.
- 5. Social equity: Seeking greater equity, at both the national and international level.

Three threads will guide the conversation in the plenary, breakout and public events throughout the day, as progressives from Europe and across the Atlantic discuss the following key challenges:













Thread I: Responding to the new politics of identity and populism

Beyond a binary world: how to win the battle of ideas on identity and internationalism

In this thread we will examine how identity issues and the nationalistic narrative of a closed society and economy have been eroding the constituency of progressive parties in both Europe and North America since the global financial crises. We will discuss opportunities to confront these challenges, strengthen progressive alliances internationally, and develop innovative ideas for progressive political leadership and mobilization. Specifically, Thread I will focus on how both governing and opposition political parties are responding to national populists, including:

• Inspiring fresh thinking on strengthening liberal democracy and the market economy;

- Addressing voters' anxieties about migration and integration and developing an action framework that corresponds with core progressive values;
- Articulating a new progressive cultural narrative that champions pluralism, tolerance and unifying political values and offers an alternative to the tribal politics of race, religion and national identity;
- Reviving the progressive narrative of internationalism and the role of the transatlantic partnership and the European social model for a post-Trump and Brexit-era.

Thread II: Building an inclusive economy and society

The centre-left promise of bigger and bolder ideas for inclusive growth, politics and governance

This thread aims at discussing and developing fresh ideas for progressive policy reforms to gain credibility on the economy, foster inclusive growth, democratic innovation and social mobility at the local, national and international levels. The discussions will be guided by the following questions:

- How are inequalities and other challenges being amplified by key drivers of economic and social change, including new technologies, high public debt, and changing demographics, and how should progressives respond?
- Where are the key opportunities for public and private investment to boost economic growth, productivity and employment?
- What role should the state play in economic and social development and how can progressives devise new and inclusive forms of governance for economic growth?
- What are the most promising strategies for institutionalising democratic innovations and mechanisms for inclusive growth? What are the major barriers to reform?

Thread III: **Ensuring a Just Transition**

The environment and big tech: successfully managing and designing structural change

This thread will explore the impact of big tech and climate change on the way we live, create economic and social value and do politics. The big challenge for progressives in this debate is twofold. First, how can we reform industrial-era policy so that businesses and industries can harness new technologies and mitigate the social downsides of economic disruption? Second, how can we promote sustainability in economy and society in order to address the challenges of climate change. The main threads of the discussion will be:

• Whether the digital era can unlock a renaissance of state interventions in economy and industrial policy;

- How to design post-industrial and progressive tax, competition, labour market, regional and data policies;
- Developing strategies, tools and policy instruments in order to increase the efforts already taken to decarbonise energy production and consumption;
- Finding ways to get real on addressing climate and sustainability;
- Examining the key challenges facing the welfare state over the next ten years and how social security systems can be updated to accommodate ongoing digital transformations.

He is Senior Fellow at the Foundation for European Progressive Studies and previously EU Commissioner for Employment, Social Affairs and Inclusion (2010-2014). Since 2015, he has been lecturing on the EU, economic governance and social policy at the Hertie School of Governance, Université libre de Bruxelles and Sciences Po. He was awarded Doctor Honoris Causa by the Sofia University of National and World Economy and the French Legion of Honour in 2014.



He currently holds the office of Secretary of State of the Presidency of Portugals Council of Ministers. In this position, he coordinates and oversees the governmental law-making process. Before becoming a member of the Portuguese Government in 2017, he worked at the European Parliament both on both constitutional and economic affairs. Previously. he served as an adviser and then chief of staff to the Secretary of State. In these positions, he advised on energy and environmental policy and participated in international climate negotiation summits, among other areas. Previously, he worked as a lawyer at a major Portuguese law firm.



She is a visiting fellow in the Center on the United States and Europe at Brookings. Célia's areas of expertise include transatlantic relations, U.S. foreign policy toward Europe, French politics and foreign policy and the role of civil society in foreign policy. Prior to joining Brookings, she served as an advisor on U.S. affairs and trans-Atlantic relations in the French foreign ministry's Centre d'Analyse, de Prévision et de Stratégie (policy planning staff) for over five years.



He is CEO of Arenagruppen, one of the premier progressive think tanks in Scandinavia. The Arena Group's Economic Council is an initiative with the aim of providing space for progressive economic thinking and stimulating independent economic research. She is a professor of Political Science at Barnard College, Columbia University. Her research interests include European history and politics, the development of democracy, populism and fascism, and the history of the left. She has written about these topics for a wide variety of publications, including the New York Times, The Washington Post, Foreign Policy, Foreign Affairs, and Vox. She currently serves on the boards of the Journal of Democracy, Dissent and Political Science Quarterly.







She is a research fellow at the Centre for European Reform. She works on European defence issues, with a focus on EU Common Defence and Security Policy, European defence industry co-operation, NATO and German foreign and defence policy. Sophia comments regularly in broadcast and print media and has contributed opinion pieces on German foreign policy to various magazines and newspapers. She has given oral evidence to the House of Commons Defence Select Committee on the subject of the future of UK-EU defence co-operation. Prior to joining the CER, Sophia was a Carlo Schmid Fellow at the Policy Planning Unit at NATO HQ and worked as a researcher for the NATO Parliamentary Assembly. She has been Secretary General of SPÖ Frauen (the women's division within the Social Democratic Party of Austria) since February 2014. In 2017 she became Deputy Secretary General of SPÖ. Andrea holds a Masters Degree in Political Science. Prior to that she was the spokesperson for former Minister of Women's Affairs Gabriele Heinisch-Hosek (2009-2014).



He is a Full Professor of Political Science at the University of Konstanz, Germany. His research focuses on comparative political economy and welfare state research, education and social policy, public spending, and theories of institutional change. Marius studied political science, economics, public administration and public law at the University of Heidelberg and the Harvard Kennedy School of Government. He holds a doctorate in political science from the University of Heidelberg and has been appointed a member of the Young Academy of Europe.



He is Shadow Minister for Digital and MP (Labour) in the British Parliament. As a Cabinet minister, he did some of the toughest jobs in government serving as Chief Secretary to the Treasury, Minister for the Cabinet Office and as the Home Office Minister responsible for immigration. He has authored over twenty books and pamphlets, covering a wide range of topics from international trade to counter-extremism. He is a member of the Council of Europe and guest lectures at Oxford University.



She has been State of Berlin Delegate to the Federation and Permanent Secretary for Active Citizenship and International Relations since 2016. Sawsan Chebli is a member of the Social Democratic Party of Germany. She was Deputy Spokesperson at the Federal Foreign Office (2014-2016). Prior to that, she was policy advisor for Intercultural Affairs at the Berlin Senate Department for the Interior and Sport (2010-2014).



He is the chairman of Volta, a progressive think tank based in Milan and Brussels. A former Deputy Mayor for Culture of Florence and Political Advisor to Prime Minister Matteo Renzi, he is the author of "Les ingénieurs du chaos", a book on populist spin-doctors that will be published in Germany at the beginning of 2020.



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She is a Senior Transatlantic Fellow and Deputy Director of the Berlin office of the German Marshall Fund of the United States. She joined GMF's Berlin office in September 2011. She oversees **GMF's Congress-Bundestag Forum** , a joint program with the Robert Bosch Foundation. Before moving to Berlin, she was the director of international programs at the U.S. Association of Former Members of Congress in Washington, DC. She established a trilateral roundtable format for legislators and launched a speakers' program involving current and former lawmakers.



She is the Vice-President of PES Women and Secretary General of the Hellenic NGO, Political Association of Women that promotes gender equality at the political, social and professional level. Zefi is an expert on environmental & energy security at SE Europe. She has developed research projects on economic and environmental policy and has a regular presence with articles and essays at various international scientific Journals and websites.



She is a British Labour and Co-operative Party politician who was elected as the Member of Parliament for Oxford East in 2017. She was formerly a Member of the European Parliament for the South East England region (2014-2017). As of May 2017, she is a Senior Lecturer in Public Policy at Aston University, Birmingham. On 3 July 2017. Anneliese was appointed as a Shadow Treasury Minister by Labour leader Jeremy Corbyn.



She is an adviser on Digital Policy for Bündnis 90/Die Grünen, the German Green Party. She holds a diploma in business informatics and a PhD in Gender Studies. After several years as a business consultant and freelance digital strategy consultant, she is currently working as a spokeswoman for a tech startup. In her free time, Laura has been involved in various feminist projects and initiatives for several years. She looked after girls from a Hamburg "Problemkiez", co-initiated the alliance "Nein zum Betreuungsgeld!", supported the #aufschrei campaign, and mentors an equal opportunities officer. As a former member of the Pirate Party, she is active in net politics and net feminism.



She is a Polish feminist, activist, social and education researcher holding PhD in Philosophy. Previously, she was a member of the National Board of the Polish political party Razem. Agnieszka is also a member of the Democracy in Europe Movement (DiEM25). In 2016, Foreign Policy magazine included her on its annual list of the 100 most influential global thinkers for her role in organizing the "black protest" against a total ban on abortion in Poland.

















She is the Secretary General of the German Advisory Council on Global Change and Policy Fellow at Das Progressive Zentrum. Her personal fields of interests are new prosperity models with an emphasis on the role of paradigm shifts as strategic leverage points, summarized in her book The Great Mindshift (Springer 2016). Maja is a scientist that combines theory with practice and formerly headed the Berlin Office of the Wuppertal Institut. She is a professor at Leuphana University, member of the Club of Rome, the Balaton Group and the Sustainable Development Solutions Network.
